Secure raw material supply & quality

- Support viable farming systems
- Promote attractive employment in agriculture

Existing concepts are not enough.

Poverty lines


- Reflect mere survival, not a decent living standard
- Not region specific

Minimum wages

Seite 8

- In many places not existent or too low to secure decent living
- Mostly not applicable for farming households or self-employed

How is the living income concept different?

Living Income is about:

- households having the ability to afford a decent standard of living.
- net actual household income being sufficient to cover costs of decent standard of living in particular place
- Decency in the context of nutrition, housing, education, healthcare, transport, other essential needs and provision for unexpected events


"The net annual income required for a household in a particular place to afford a decent standard of living for all members of that household."

- Other methods by companies and organisations


Important note: In the absence of a Living Income benchmark you can still start action by working towards alternative reference values as intermediate goals!

Step 2: Determine actual household income



Methodologies

- using farm economic model (revenues minus production costs)
- estimation models with easy-to-access variables
- mixed-methods

Important considerations

- Balance between precicion & needed resources
- Income composition (% of focus crop)
- Availability & quality of secondary data







Results for the cocoa sector

Income distribution and LI gap for cocoa households in CIV





Key insights of KIT studies:


- 87% vs. 83% of cocoa producing households in CIV vs. GH are not earning a living income
- Significant differences in income gaps, partly explained by differing household and farm characteristics
